




SHELTON, Wash. - The 19th Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Officer (CVEO) Basic Training Class recruits are wrapping up week two!

These photos, just a tiny glimpse into their week, show the recruits being fitted for their HEPA and gas masks. Those stylish yellow things are fit testing hoods. A fit testing hood aims to ensure the department-issued gas mask and HEPA mask fit properly and protect the employee from various contaminates or hazardous materials they may be exposed to on the job. While a person wears their mask and fit testing hood, the instructors spray a sweet or bitter mist into the hood. They know the mask doesn't fit properly if they smell or taste the spray. If they can't smell or taste the spray, they know the mask fits correctly. CVEO recruits also learned first aid, Narcan administration, and practiced on our emergency vehicle operations course
