
Lateral Class recruitment continues

Home for the Holidays campaign begins

Efforts to continue through New Year's Day

STATEWIDE - The Washington State Patrol (WSP), in partnership with the Washington Traffic Safety Commission (WTSC) and law enforcement agencies across the state, will begin the 'Home for the Holidays' traffic safety campaign this weekend.

The educational campaign continues through New Year's Eve with a focus on reminding and encouraging drivers to take extra precautions in adverse weather conditions such as snow, rain, ice, and fog. The fall and winter months also bring less daylight, making it important for drivers to maintain awareness for vulnerable road users such as pedestrians and hievelists

The WSP historically observes an increase in collisions of all types during this time frame, as well as an increase of impaired drivers during the fall and winter months.

Encouraging drivers to make good choices behind the wheel is especially important considering the rise in fatality collisions over the past several years. According to preliminary WTSC data, there have been nearly as many fatal collisions through September 2023 (578) as compared to the same timeframe in 2022 (582). Last year was a 32-year high for fatality collisions across Washington state.

"Fatality collisions are preventable tragedies, and we must all do our part in order to help save lives," said WSP Chief John R. Batiste. "Buckling up, slowing down, and driving sober can help make sure we all make it home to our loved ones for the holidays."

According to the WTSC data, 776 lives were lost across the state due to traffic related collisions in the months of October, November, and December from 2018 to 2022. Of those tragedies, 40 percent involved impaired drivers, 30 percent involved excessive speed, 16 percent involved distracted drivers, and 29 percent of those killed were pedestrians or pedal cyclists



WSP employees participate in 'Great Shake Out'









OLYMPIA, Wash. - The Washington State Patrol (WSP) participated in last month's Great Shakeout Drill, an earthquake simulation to remind employees how to protect themselves when the earth begins shaking. This year, the agency's Incident Management Team (IMT) was in day four of a five-day training at the Helen Sommers Building where they were simulating an agency response to a 6.8 earthquake that primarily affected District 1. The exercise design team built the Great Shakeout into the exercise scenario so that the IMT experienced an "aftershock" during their planning and response efforts. All IMT members successfully implemented the Drop, Cover, and Hold On...just as they would have done in an actual earthquake!

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WSP receives award for support of Chief for a Day

AGENCY AWARD - The Washington State Patrol (WSP) was awarded the 2023 Pacific Northwest Summit Awards for the Multi-Agency Collaborative Program category, an award sponsored by the Washington Festival and Events Association, for participation in the 2023 Chief for a Day event in Wenatchee, Wash.

The award accompanied a description of the event, which states: "Chief for a Day is an opportunity to celebrate the lives of chronically and/or terminally ill children from our area. The hope is to provide these children with a day of fun they will never forget and to become a part of their precious lives.

The purpose of the Chief for a Day Program is to create partners between local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies, hospitals, and the community to provide a day of special attention to chronically ill children. Each child is selected and sponsored by a law enforcement agency.

The children, or "Little Chiefs," are provided with tailored law enforcement uniforms matching their sponsoring agencies, including badges and are honorarily sworn into office for a day. The students are selected through a nomination process and the Chief for a Day organization reaches out to area schools in

The schools select their student, and then obtain parent approval. Nominations then turn into an announcement with a classroom visit from their sponsoring agency early in the
