## STATE PATROL DEC. 1, 2023 Supporting SJ: Olympia detachment visit girl recovering from tragic crash





OLYMPIA, Wash. - Olympia troopers met with SJ - an 8-year-old girl who returned to school this week after being involved in a horrific collision with a wrong-way driver that claimed the life of her mother and two-year-old brother last month

SJ and her family were on Interstate 5 heading home just before 11 p.m. on Nov. 10 to their home in Olympia when their car was struck head-on by a Jeep traveling the wrong way. SJ sustained serious injuries in the crash, but miraculously survived. Tragically, her mother and brother were killed.

After enduring weeks of recovery, SJ has been cleared to return home with her family and recently was able to return to school for the first time this week. The troopers and detectives who responded to the scene that night met with SJ the morning she returned to class, bringing her gifts and plenty of well wishes.
